



Food Security, Sustainability and Cuba's Economic Transition

Immerse yourself in bright, beautiful Cuba while studying this Caribbean country's changing economic policies. Experience the evolution of

Cuba's economy and society as part of this two-week study abroad course focusing on food security, environmental sustainability and the country's transitioning economy.

In the nation's capital of Havana, you'll learn about Cuba's history alongside its political, economic and health care systems. Guest lectures, interactions with local students, and field trips to organic farms will expose you to Cuban agriculture, farming policies and growing practices. You'll also tour farmers markets, bodegas and supermarkets; a variety of farming operations; and a local health clinic in Havana.

Explore Cuban culture by visiting the Museum of the Revolution and Fábrica de Arte Cubano, taking a salsa lesson, touring in antique cars and dining at "paladares." Relish the beauty of Cuba's countryside and the magnificence of its beaches in overnight excursions to Viñales and Matanzas.

Explore an evolving country and gain a greater understanding of international economics, policy and trade, agriculture, and the environment.
